**BACKGROUND/PROPOSAL:**

Having worked through the set of recommended policies, the next step in the Bylaw and Policy Project is to review some fundamental municipal bylaws. Administration is bringing forward a new Nuisance bylaw, referenced as Bylaw #2020-3, and which generally replaces the provisions of Bylaw #2005-6 (Untidy and Unsightly Bylaw).

**DISCUSSION/OPTIONS/BENEFITS/DISADVANTAGES:**

Administration has drafted the attached revised procedural bylaw on the new bylaw format.

Bylaw #2020-3 addresses the recent changes to the Municipal Government Act and is constant with the current procedural practices of the municipality generally. The only major change in practice is the inclusion of a “cost plus” remedy where by any property who has an order issued against them and does not remedy the order within a set time will see the cost to remedy (initiated by the SV enforcement officer), PLUS a 25% administrative surcharge, charged to the property (and if unpaid transferred to the tax role). This keeps the “penalty structure” more management for administration as compared to \$100 for this infraction, and \$125 for this other one, etc.).

The bylaw also removes some of the particulars about noise infractions – which will be covered under a new Noise Bylaw (5(b) 2020-4 on the current agenda).

**COSTS/SOURCE OF FUNDING (if applicable)**

There are no expected costs that would result from passing Bylaw #2020-3, as drafted and presented.

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**A BYLAW OF THE SUMMER VILLAGE OF NAKAMUN PARK, IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA, FOR MATTERS RELATED TO REGULATING UNTIDY AND UNSIGHTLY PREMISES**

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**WHEREAS, PURSUANT TO** Part 2 of the Municipal Government Act, being Chapter M-26 R.S.A 2000 and amendments thereto, Council may by Bylaw, regulate untidy and unsightly premises, nuisances, pests and buildings dangerous to public safety.

**AND WHEREAS,** the Council of the Summer Village of Nakamun Park deems it proper and expedient to pass such a Bylaw:

**NOW THEREFORE** the Council of the Summer Village of Nakamun Park, in the Province of Alberta, duly assembled, enacts as follows:

**1.0 SHORT TITLE**

1.1. This bylaw may be cited as "Nuisance Bylaw"

**2.0 DEFINITIONS**

**2.1 "Animal Material"** means any animal excrement and includes all material accumulated on a premise from pet pens, yards, stables, veterinary clinics or hospitals, kennels or feed lots;

**2.2 "Ashes"** means the powdery residue accumulated on a premise left after the combustion of any substance and includes any partially burnt wood, charcoal or coal;

**2.3 "Authorized Person"** will mean any person authorized to act on behalf of Council of the Summer Village of Nakamun Park

**2.4 "Building Material"** means all construction and demolition material accumulated on a premises while constructing, altering, repairing or demolishing any structure and includes but is not limited to, earth, vegetation or rock displaced during such construction, alteration or repair;

**2.5 "Bylaw Enforcement Officer"** will mean any person authorized to act on behalf of the Council of the Summer Village of Nakamun Park, including a Peace Officer.

**2.6 "Building Material"** means all construction and demolition material accumulated on a premises while constructing, altering, repairing or demolishing any structure and includes, but is not limited to, earth, vegetation or rock displaced during such construction, altering or repair;

**2.7 "Clean Up Order"** means an Order issued under this bylaw by a Peace Officer with respect to an unsightly premises within the Summer Village;

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- 2.8 "Council"** shall be the Council of the Summer Village of Nakamun Park.
- 2.9 "Enforcement Officer"** means a Peace Officer of the Summer Village including a Peace Officer appointed pursuant to the Alberta Peace Officer Act, or a Municipal Bylaw Enforcement Officer appointed by the Summer Village of Nakamun Park including any contracted Peace Officers.
- 2.10 "Garbage"** means material composed of organic matter which is or may become decomposed, including the by-products from the preparation, consumption or storage of food;
- 2.11 "Occupant"** will mean the owner or agent of the owner of lands and premises therein or on and shall include a corporation, lessee or tenant.
- 2.12 "Owner"** means a person who is registered under the Land Titles Act as the owner of the land;
- 2.12.1 the person who is recorded as the owner of the property on the assessment roll of the Summer Village;
- 2.12.2 a person who has purchased or otherwise acquired the land, whether he has purchased or otherwise acquired the land directly from the owner or from another purchaser and has not become the registered owner thereof;
- 2.12.3 a person holding himself out as the person having the powers and authority of ownership or who for the time being exercises the powers and authority of ownership;
- 2.12.4 a person controlling the property under construction, or;
- 2.12.5 a person who is the occupant of the property under a lease, license or permit
- 2.13 "Pest"** will mean any animal, insect, or pests and diseases deemed by the Council of the Summer Village of Nakamun Park to be dangerous, destructive or a nuisance to human life, plants and/or animals and other property.
- 2.14 "Premises"** means the external surfaces of all buildings and the whole or part of any land, including land immediately adjacent to any building or buildings, situated in whole or in part in the Summer Village and includes any land or buildings owned or leased by the Summer Village,
- 2.15 "Right of Access"** means the right of an Enforcement Officer to enter onto a property to inspect the property and to determine whether to issue a Clean Up Order, or to allow work forces access to the property for the purposes of enforcing a Clean Up Order;

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**2.16 "Summer Village"** means the Summer Village of Nakamun Park;

**2.17 "Summer Village Administrator"** means the person designated by Council as its chief administrative officer or their designate;

**2.18 "Unsightly or Untidy"** will mean any property or part of it which is characterized by visual evidence of a lack of general maintenance and upkeep by the excessive accumulation on the premises of:

2.18.1 any rubbish, refuse, garbage, papers, packages, containers, bottles, cans, manure, human excrement or sewage or the whole or a part of an animal carcass, dirt, soil, gravel, rocks, sod, petroleum products, hazardous materials, disassembled equipment or machinery, broken household dishes and utensils, boxes, cartons and discarded fabrics, furniture and carpet;

2.18.2 the whole or part of any motor vehicle or derelict vehicles or trailers which has no current license plate attached to it and in respect of which, no registration certificate has been issued for the current year, and which is inoperative by reason of removed parts or equipment.

2.18.3 equipment or machinery which has been rendered inoperative by reason of its disassembly, age or mechanical condition and includes any household appliances;

2.18.4 animal, material, yard material, ashes, building material and garbage as defined in this Bylaw;

2.18.5 grass, dandelions or noxious weeds

**2.19 "Unsightly Premises Appeal Board"** means the appeal board constituted and established by this Bylaw which is empowered to hear and determine appeals lodged against Clean Up Orders issued by an Enforcement Officer;

**2.20 "Work Forces"** means Summer Village employees or contract workers engaged by the Summer Village for the purposes of enforcing a Clean Up Order;

**2.21 "Yard Material"** means organic matter formed as a result of gardening or horticultural pursuits and includes grass, tree and hedge cuttings and clippings.

### **3.0 RESIDENT REQUIREMENTS**

**3.1** All occupants will be required to control dandelions and noxious weeds on property they own or occupy.

**3.2** All occupants will prune, remove or otherwise maintain trees and shrubs that interfere

with or endanger utility lines, poles, or other related works of the municipality.

- 3.3** No person will permit the accumulation of dirt, stones, trees, old implements, automobiles, scrap iron or any other rubbish so as to cause an unsightly condition, hazard or nuisance.
- 3.4** No person will permit the proliferation of, or harbour, any insect, animal or other pest that is likely to spread disease, be destructive or dangerous, or otherwise become a nuisance.
- 3.5** No owner will cause, allow or permit a building structure, erection, excavation or hole on his land to become ruinous, dilapidated, unsafe, unprotected or dangerous to public safety and health

#### **4.0 BYLAW CONTRAVENTION AND REMEDIES**

- 4.1** A Bylaw Enforcement Officer or any other person duly authorized by Council is hereby authorized to enter lands within the Summer Village of Nakamun Park for the inspection of conditions that may contravene or fail to comply with the provisions of this Bylaw.
- 4.2** When a condition exists which contravenes any of the provisions of this Bylaw the Officer, or any person duly authorized by Council may:
- 4.2.1 Issue a warning notice to the owner, agent, lessee and/or occupier of the land or premises in question, advising of the condition and directing as to what conditions are to be rectified within fifteen (15) days from the date of issuing the warning notice, and/or
- 4.2.2 Issue a written order to the owner, agent, lessee and/or occupier of the land or premises in question and direct that the condition be rectified within fifteen (15) days from the date of issuing the order.
- 4.3** Should any property owner, agent, lessee or occupier fail, neglect or refuse to remedy the condition as directed by the Bylaw Enforcement Officer, or person authorized by Council, the Summer Village of Nakamun Park may cause the work to be performed to remedy the condition and charge the costs, plus a 25% administrative surcharge, of such work as follows:
- 4.3.1 To recover the same as a debt due the Summer Village, or
- 4.3.2 To charge the cost against the land concerned as taxes due and owing in respect of that land and recover the cost as such.

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**4.4** Any person who enters property to remedy a condition as directed by order of Council, shall be deemed to have the authorization of Council and shall not incur any liability therefor.

#### **5.0 SEVERABILITY**

If any section or sections of this Bylaw or parts thereof are found in any court or law to be illegal or beyond the power of Council to enact, such Section or Sections or parts thereof shall be deemed to be severable and all other Sections or parts of the Bylaw shall be deemed separate and independent therefrom and to be enacted as such.

#### **6.0 RESCINDING**

**This bylaw rescinds** This bylaw rescinds Bylaw# 2005-06.

#### **7.0 COMING INTO FORCE**

This Bylaw shall become effective when it has received third and final reading and has been signed by the Mayor and Chief Administrative Officer.

### **BACKGROUND/PROPOSAL:**

Having worked through the set of recommended policies, the next step in the Bylaw and Policy Project is to review some fundamental municipal bylaws. Administration is bringing forward a new Noise Control bylaw, referenced as Bylaw #2020-4. This is an entirely new bylaw for council consideration; while the old Untidy and Unsightly Bylaw, the current Land Use Bylaw, and other incidental bylaws, such as the Fireworks Bylaw, all speak generally to some aspects of "noise pollution" or noise as a detriment in some manner – this new bylaw codifies Noise violations and establishes a mechanism and penalty schedule that Bylaw Enforcement can use.

### **DISCUSSION/OPTIONS/BENEFITS/DISADVANTAGES:**

Administration has drafted the attached revised procedural bylaw on the new bylaw format.

Bylaw #2020-4 is meant to address and differentiate between residential and commercial noise and give flexibility to municipal enforcement in establishing when a noise violation has occurred. Critically, the bylaw also establishes – under Schedule "A" - a penalty schedule. I would encourage council to consider three main aspects when reviewing the bylaw:

- 1) do the "times" listed work for noise prohibition (11pm-7am)
- 2) while the general concept of noise is subjective, do the examples for residential noises meet your expectations?
- 3) do the amounts and levels of penalties in the schedule "A" tiers work for you?

### **COSTS/SOURCE OF FUNDING (if applicable)**

There are no expected costs that would result from passing Bylaw #2020-4, as drafted and presented, but it does give the municipality some teeth and a way to recover some costs for bylaw enforcement.

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**A BYLAW OF THE SUMMER VILLAGE OF NAKAMUN PARK, IN THE PROVINCE  
OF ALBERTA, FOR MATTERS RELATED TO THE  
CONTROL OF NOISE BY PROHIBITING, ELIMINATING OR ABATEMENT**

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**WHEREAS** under the Authority of the *Municipal Government Act RSA 2000 Chapter M-26*, section 7 (a) (b) and (i), 8 (a) (b) authorizes Council to pass bylaws respecting safety, health, welfare and the protection of people and property; and

**WHEREAS** the *Traffic Safety Act R.S.A. 2000 T-06*, as amended, Part 1 Division 3 Section 13 (1) (g) provides that the Council of a Municipality may make Bylaws defining what constitutes objectionable noise, devising a system or method of determining or measuring that noise, and prohibiting the operation of Motor Vehicles which in any manner make objectionable noise;

**AND WHEREAS** under the Authority of the *Municipal Government Act RSA 2000 Chapter M-26*, section 8 (a) (b) authorizes the Council of the Summer Village of Nakamun Park to prepare Bylaw restricting, mitigating and abating activities which give rise to unnecessary noise in the Village, especially during hours normally used for sleeping;

**AND WHEREAS** the intent of this Bylaw is that all noise shall be reduced as far as possible to be compatible with the normal activities of urban life while recognizing the recreational nature of the municipality, and that unnecessary noise be eliminated.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, the Council of the Summer Village of Nakamun Park in the Province of Alberta duly assembled, enacts as follows:

**TITLE**

1. This Bylaw may be cited as the "Noise Bylaw."

**DEFINITIONS**

2. In this Bylaw:
  - 2.1) "Bylaw Enforcement Officer" means a Bylaw Enforcement Officer appointed by the Village pursuant to the Municipal Government Act, to enforce the Village's Bylaws, and includes a Community Peace Officer, a member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and, when authorized, a Special Constable;

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- 2.2) "Construction Equipment" shall include but not necessarily be limited to a riveting machine, concrete mixer, gravel crusher, steam shovel, dragline, backhoe, air or steam compressor, jackhammer or pneumatic drill, tractor, bulldozer, front-end loader, motor scraper, motor grader or any other tool, device, or machine of a noisy nature;
- 2.3) "Land Use Bylaw" means the Land Use Bylaw #2007-3 or new # of the Summer Village of Nakamun, as amended from time to time or any Bylaw passed in substitution for or in addition to Bylaw #2007-3 or new #;
- 2.4) "Motor Vehicle" means Motor Vehicle as defined in the *Traffic Safety Act* RSA 2000 T06as amended;
- 2.5) "Noise" means any sound which is, or is considered to be sharp or piercing; or shrill; or explosive; or unnecessarily loud; or persistent and/or annoying, but shall not include a sound intended to warn persons of danger or emergencies;
- 2.6) "Off-Highway Vehicle" means an Off-Highway Vehicle as defined in the *Traffic Safety Act*, R.S.A. 2000 T06, as amended Part 6;
- 2.7) "Person" includes an individual, partnership, corporation, trustee, executor or manager;
- 2.8) "Signaling Device" means a horn, gong, bell, klaxon or other device producing an audible sound for the purpose of drawing a person's attention to an approaching vehicle, including a bicycle;
- 2.9) "Village" means the Summer Village of Nakamun Park or the area contained within the boundaries of the Summer Village of Nakamun Park;
- 2.10) "Violation Tag" means a ticket or similar document issued by the Village pursuant to the *Municipal Government Act* RSA 2000-M26, as amended;
- 2.11) "Violation Ticket" means a ticket issued pursuant to the Provincial Offenses Procedures Act, as amended and Regulations thereunder.

**VIOLATIONS:**

3. In this Bylaw:

- 3.1) Except to the extent allowed under this Bylaw, no person shall cause or permit any other person to cause a noise within the Village;

- 3.2) No Person shall allow property under their ownership or control to be used in such a way that there is noise originating from the property.
- 3.3) A Bylaw Enforcement Officer may direct any person who has caused or made a noise, or any person who owns or controls property from which noise has originated, to abate or eliminate the noise. Such a direction may be either verbal or written.
- 3.4) Where an activity which is not specifically prohibited by any federal, provincial or municipal laws or regulations, including this Bylaw and which involves creating or making a sound which:
- 3.4.1. is or may become;
- 3.4.2. creates or produces or may create or produce a Noise;
- a person engaging in such an activity shall do so in such a manner as to create as little sound as practicable under the circumstances.

**DOMESTIC NOISES:**

4. No person shall operate any powered equipment, including lawnmowers, snow blowers, garden tillers and built-in vacuum cleaners that are vented to the outside in a residential zone between the hours of eleven o'clock (11:00pm) in the evening and seven o'clock (7:00am) in the morning of the next day.

**CONSTRUCTION NOISES:**

5. Persons owning or controlling Construction Equipment, and Persons owning or controlling land on which Construction Equipment is being operated shall be exempt from the provisions of this Bylaw if:
- (a) the noise is generated pursuant to work done in the normal manner to that industry;
- (b) the noise is generated between the hours of seven o'clock (7:00am) in the morning and eleven o'clock (11:00pm) in the evening of that same day.

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- (c) all necessary federal, provincial and municipal permits, licenses and approvals have been obtained and the work is not contrary to any federal, provincial or municipal laws or regulations.

## **PENALTIES**

- 6.1) A person who disobeys a direction pursuant to Section 3.3 above is guilty of an offence and is liable to a penalty in the amount stated in Schedule "A" of this bylaw.
- 6.2) Any person who contravenes any provision of this Bylaw other than disobedience of a direction is guilty of an offence and is liable to a penalty stated in Schedule "A" of this bylaw.
- 6.3) Under no circumstances shall any person contravening any provision of this Bylaw be subject to the penalty of imprisonment.

## **VIOLATION TAGS**

- 7.1) A Bylaw Enforcement Officer is hereby authorized and empowered to issue a Violation Tag to any person who the Bylaw Enforcement officer has reasonable and probable grounds to believe has contravened any provision of this Bylaw.
- 7.2) A Violation Tag may be issued to such person either personally, or by mailing a copy to such Person at his or her last know post office address.
- 7.3) The Violation tag shall be in a form approved by the Municipal Administrator and shall state:
  - 7.3.1 the name of the person;
  - 7.3.2 the offence;
  - 7.3.3 the appropriate penalty for the offence being the minimum penalty prescribed by this Bylaw;
  - 7.3.4 that the penalty shall be paid within thirty (30) days of the issuance of the Violation Tag;
  - 7.3.5 any other information as may be required by the Municipal Administrator.
- 7.4) Where a contravention of this Bylaw is of a continuing nature, further Violation Tags may be issued by the Bylaw Enforcement Officer, provided that no more

than one Violation Tag shall be issued for each day that the contravention continues.

- 7.5) Where a Violation Tag is issued pursuant to this Bylaw, the Person to whom the Violation Tag is issued, may in lieu of being prosecuted for the offence, pay to the Village the penalty specified in the Violation Tag.
- 7.6) Nothing in this Bylaw shall prevent a Bylaw Enforcement officer from immediately issuing a Violation Ticket.

**VIOLATION TICKET**

- 8. If the penalty specified on a Violation Tag is not paid within the prescribed time period, then a Bylaw Enforcement Officer, is hereby authorized and empowered to issue a Violation Ticket pursuant to the Provincial Offenses Procedures Act.

**SEVERABILITY PROVISION**

- 9. Should any provision of this Bylaw be invalid, then such provision shall be severed and the remaining Bylaw shall be maintained.

**RESCINDING**

- 10. This bylaw is a new bylaw and does not rescind, in whole or in part, and other lawfully passed bylaw within the Summer Village of Nakamun Park in full force or effect prior to the adoption of this bylaw.

**COMING INTO FORCE**

- 11. This bylaw shall become effective when it has received third and final reading and has been signed by the Mayor and Chief Administrative Officer.

**READ** a first time this 19<sup>th</sup> day of February 2020.

**READ** a second time this 19<sup>th</sup> day of February 2020.

**UNANIMOUS CONSENT** to proceed to third reading 19<sup>th</sup> day of February 2020.

**READ** a third and final time this 19<sup>th</sup> day of February 2020.

### **BACKGROUND/PROPOSAL:**

The municipality is required to have a Development Authority Bylaw establishing a Development Authority for the municipality, as per the MGA. The existing bylaw was passed in 2004 and takes the format and substance of bylaws passed at that time. As part of the Bylaw and Policy review Project we have drafted a new Development Authority Bylaw, referenced as 2020-5.

### **DISCUSSION/OPTIONS/BENEFITS/DISADVANTAGES:**

Bylaw 2020-5 is presented in the new bylaw format.

Bylaw 2020-5 has much of the same substance as the existing bylaw, with one major revision worthy of special mention. This revision is that the new bylaw removes mention to the specific name of the person(s) being assigned as development authority; the old interpretation was that this bylaw was needed to appoint the "person" (in our case D.O. Sonnleitner). My interpretation of the Act is that this bylaw is required not to name the person, but rather to establish which of the possible organizational components will constitute the Development Authority. Under the Act Development authority can be any or all or a mix of Development Officers (Staff), Municipal Planning Commission (MPC, a committee of council), or Council as a whole. The Development Authority Bylaw is sometimes combined, but regardless in all cases needs to be consistent with the Land Use Bylaw.

Nakamun Park has traditionally assigned all responsibility as Development Authority to the Development Officer. I do not recommend changing this and the draft new bylaw reflects this. We can further discuss the implications of this, and the alternatives for assigning authority, during the meeting if needed.

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**THIS IS A BYLAW OF THE SUMMER VILLAGE OF NAKAMUN PARK, IN  
THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA, TO ESTABLISH A DEVELOPMENT  
AUTHORITY WITHIN AND FOR THE MUNICIPALITY.**

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**WHEREAS** Section 624 of the Municipal Government Act, RSA 2000 requires each municipality to provide for a Development Authority to exercise development powers and duties on behalf of the municipality;

**AND WHEREAS** the Summer Village of Nakamun Park desires to establish and define the Development Authority for the municipality;

**AND IN CONSIDERATION OF** the provisions of Bylaw 2019-5, duly passed, which establishes and defines various positions as Designated Officers, including Development Officers;

**NOW THEREFORE**, the Council of the Summer Village of Nakamun Park, in the Province of Alberta, duly assembled, enacts as follows:

**TITLE**

1. This Bylaw may be referenced as the "Development Authority Bylaw"

**DEFINITIONS**

2. In this Bylaw, the following terms shall have the following meanings:
  - 2.1. "Act" means, unless expressly defined otherwise, the Municipal Government Act, RSA 2000, c M-26, and the regulations thereunder, as amended from time to time;
  - 2.2. "Bylaw" means this Development Authority Bylaw;
  - 2.3. "CAO" means the Chief Administrative Officer for the Summer Village of Nakamun Park;
  - 2.4. "Council" means the municipal council of the Summer Village of Nakamun Park;
  - 2.5. "Development Officer" has the same meaning as defined in the Municipal Government Act.

**INTERPRETATION**

3. In this Bylaw the following shall apply to interpretations:
  - 3.1. Any reference in this Bylaw to any statutes, regulations, bylaws or other enactments is to those statutes, regulations, bylaws or other enactments, as amended or replaced from time to time, and to any lawful amendments thereto;
  - 3.2. Whenever a singular or masculine form of a word is used in this Bylaw it shall be interpreted to include the plural, feminine or neutral form of the word as the context requires;

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3.3. The headings in this Bylaw do not form part of this Bylaw and shall not affect its interpretation.

**GENERAL**

4. The following are General Provisions of this Bylaw:

- 4.1. The Development Authority for the Summer Village of Nakamun Park is hereby established and is referred to hereafter as the "Development Authority;"
- 4.2. The Development Authority for the Summer Village of Nakamun Park shall operate under the name of the Development Authority for the Summer Village of Nakamun Park;
- 4.3. The position of Development Officer is hereby established, and the Development Officer shall serve as the Development Authority for the Summer Village of Nakamun Park;
- 4.4. Subject to the provisions of Chief Administrative Officer and Designated Officer Bylaw, as amended from time to time, the Development Officer is authorized to act as a Designated Officer;
- 4.5. The Development Officer, whether employed directly by the municipality or engaged through a service contract, shall be appointed by resolution of Council and confirmed annually, or as often as required, as part of the Organizational Meeting, notwithstanding the CAOs authority to hire and designate authorities under the Act or any applicable enactment;
- 4.6. The Development Officer, on behalf of the Development Authority, may sign any order, decision, approval, notice or other thing made or given by it;
- 4.7. The powers, duties and functions of the Development Authority, and Development Officer, shall be carried out in accordance to the Summer Village of Nakamun Park Land Use Bylaw, as amended from time to time, and subject to such powers as described under the Act.

**RESCINDING**

5. This Bylaw rescinds and replaces Bylaw #2004-6.

**COMING INTO FORCE**

6. This Bylaw shall come into force and have effect on the date of the third and final reading and signing of this Bylaw by the Mayor and Chief Administrative Officer.

**SEVERABILITY**

7. If any portion of this bylaw is declared invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, then the

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invalid portion must be severed, and the remainder of the bylaw is deemed valid and remains in force.

**READ** a first time on this 19<sup>th</sup> day of February, 2020

**READ** a second time on this 19<sup>th</sup> day of February 2020

**UNANIMOUS CONSENT** to proceed to third reading on this 19<sup>th</sup> day of February, 2020.

Alberta Beach Council at their January 21<sup>st</sup>, 2020 regular Council meeting passed a motion #007-20 that states: Alberta Beach will not entertain payment for emergency services on the lake or outside Alberta Beach municipal boundaries.

Our contract with the Town of Onoway section 4.2 states: The Town shall make best efforts to respond to every emergency call respecting the need for fire services within the municipal boundaries of Alberta Beach.

We have been told repeatedly by the Province of Alberta that our municipal boundary is the wet water mark on the shores of Lac Ste. Anne Lake, where we have no rights or authority.

If Onoway Regional Fire Service chooses to respond to calls on the lake outside our municipal boundaries, it's then their responsibility to invoice the appropriate parties directly, regardless of where the emergency call originated.

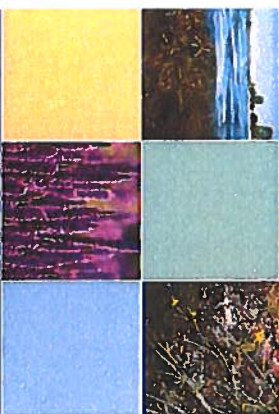
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# Water Invaders

Plants that can change Alberta's waters and wetlands

A GUIDE TO INVASIVE PLANTS FOR BOATERS, COTTAGE OWNERS, AND WATER GARDENERS



## What are invasive species or "unwanted invaders"?

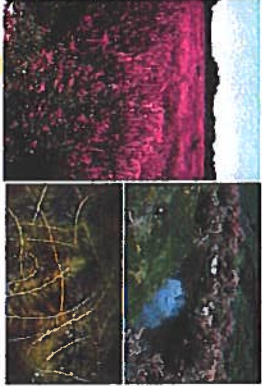
Invasive species are plants, animals, or other organisms, growing in places other than the native region in which they originate, that have the unique ability to outcompete or replace indigenous native organisms. Coming from ecosystems in other geographic regions, "unwanted invaders" are free of natural enemies. Lacking the checks and balances from their own natural environments, invasive species have a distinct advantage over native species whose populations are kept in check naturally by native predators, competitors or diseases.

## Why should you care?

Invasive species tend to be aggressive, and can reproduce at a high rate, giving them the ability to "take over" entire areas by choking out native plants and animals. This reduces the biodiversity (variety of life) in an area, degrading or diminishing habitats for wildlife, including birds, insects and microorganisms. Invasive species can become costly crop weeds, impede water flow and quality, and interfere with recreational activities like boating or fishing.

## Quick Tips

- Do not dump bait or bait water
- Never dump aquarium contents into water
- Spread the information – not the invasives



## Detection is important!

Invasive species are a major threat to natural ecosystems around the world, and Alberta's birds and waters are no exception.

Species featured in this brochure are relatively new, or do not yet exist in the wild within Alberta, e.g., Salt Cedar, Eurasian Watermilfoil, and Hydrilla. In some instances, it may still be possible to contain, eradicate, or, ideally, prevent introduction of newer species like these. In all cases, the goal must be to limit the spread of all invasive species within the province.



Alberta has 800 lakes with fish and over 200 anglers per lake. Many Albertans can be impacted by water loving invasive plants.

# SHORES AND MARSHES

## Purple Loosestrife

*Lythrum salicaria* (aka Lythrum)

**HABITAT:** Mostly along freshwater, wetlands and ditches.  
**DESCRIPTION:** Many stems per plant; to 2 m. In some square-shaped; leaves dark green, lance shaped, opposite; showy purple flower spikes July to Sept.; up to 2 million seeds per plant.

**TIPS:** Loss of native flora and fauna; degradation of wetland habitats; clogging of irrigation systems.

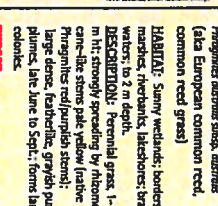


## Flowering Rush

*Adiantum nuttallii*

**HABITAT:** Shoresides and in water to 3 m. depth, wet ditches, irrigation canals; water gardens.  
**DESCRIPTION:** Perennial; emergent (from flowering) 1-1.5m. Ht. rust-like; non-emergent (from non-flowering) 1m; floating rhizomes; pale umbel of flowers June to Aug; bulbs on rhizomes; can grow from disturbed; cross-section of leaf blade diamond.

**TIPS:** Displaces native shoreline vegetation; interferes with boating and swimming; changes fish and bird habitat – favors non-native predator fish.

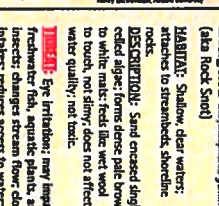


## Yellow Flag Iris

*Iris pseudacorus* (aka Pale Yellow Iris)

**HABITAT:** Wet ditches, marshes, water gardens.  
**DESCRIPTION:** Perennial; showy yellow iris flowers late spring to early summer; large, drooping, yellow scape with purple-brown markings; 3 upward pointing petals; 0.9-1.2m. Ht. long, dark green, sword-like leaves; spreads by rhizomes, and seeds; withstands drought, acidic or brackish water.

**TIPS:** Fast spreading in ditches and marshes; forms almost impenetrable mats; displaces native plants and animals; loss of diversity; native habitat access.



## Himalayan Balsam

*Impatiens glandulifera*

**HABITAT:** Himalayan orchid, Ornamental (aka Jewelweed, Touch-Me-Not)  
**DESCRIPTION:** Succulent, annual mesoic, riparian weed.  
**DESCRIPTION:** Succulent, annual 0.5-1 m Ht.; stems purple-tinged and hairy; flowers 1-petal to purple, double; capsule when touched; partially shade tolerant.

**TIPS:** Can dominate water edges – loss of diversity; dies after first frost – erosion, siltation of water.



## Invasive Phragmites

*Phragmites australis* subsp. *communis* (aka European common reed, common reed grass)

**HABITAT:** Sunny wetlands; borders of marshes, riverbanks, lakeshores; breadth waters; to 2 m depth.  
**DESCRIPTION:** Perennial grass, 1-7 m Ht.; strongly spreading by rhizomes; cane-like stems pale yellow (alive) Phragmites red/purple stems; large dense, feathery, grayish purple plumes, late June to Sept.; forms large colonies.

**TIPS:** Blocks light and occupies all space below ground; produces monoculture; displaces wild rice, cattails, and native wetland orchids; reduces habitat.



## Didymo

*Didymosphenia geminata* (aka Rock Snot)

**HABITAT:** Shallow, clear waters; attaches to streambeds, shoreline rocks.  
**DESCRIPTION:** Sand encased single celled algal; forms dense pale brown to white mats; feels like wet wool to touch, not slimy; does not affect water quality; not toxic.  
**TIPS:** Eye irritation; may limit freshwater fish, aquatic plants, and invertebrates; changes stream flow; dogs water inlets; reduces access to water; aesthetically, transported on felt boot soles – see non-felt soles!





# Boaters & Anglers: YOU CAN HELP!

**Inspect** your boat, motor, trailer and boating equipment such as anchors and fishing gear, centerboards, rollers, and seats.



**Clean** your boat, tackle, downriggers, trailer, and other boating equipment by removing any plant parts, scum, mussels, or other organisms that are visible before leaving any waterbody. Some aquatic species can survive more than two weeks out of water.

In waterbodies where harmful organisms are known to be present, thoroughly wash equipment with high pressure water (250 psi) to dislodge all small parts and propagules.

**Drain** water from the motor, the well, bilge and transom wells while on land immediately before leaving the waterbody.

**Dry** your boat and equipment in the sun before transporting them to another body of water. When moving from an infested waterbody, dry your boat and equipment for at least 5 days before entering another waterbody.

**Inspect your boat** and trailer on land before leaving any body of water. Never release the bait into water or release aquatic animals from one water body into another.

**Learn** how to identify invasive species.

## Why should I care?

Exotic weeds threaten the habitat of wildlife by altering natural communities. Invasive weeds can wipe out the native vegetation. For example, food and cover needed by birds, mammals and fish.



**STOP AQUATIC HITCHHIKERS!**  
Prevent the transport of nuisance species. Clean all recreational equipment.



**Aquatic invasive species often travel from one body of water to another by "hitching a ride" on recreational equipment, and animals.**

### CLEAN

Remove all plants, animals, and mud. Thoroughly wash everything, including crevices and other hidden areas.

### DRAIN

Thoroughly drain your boat before leaving the area, including the well, bilge, and engine cooling water.

### DRY

Allow time for your boat to completely dry before launching in other waters.

## WARNING - APPROVAL REQUIRED!

In Alberta, before any vegetation control work is done in or near water, an approval is required. For information on approval requirements for shoreline work:

## What can you do?

Prevention, early detection and rapid response are critical for seeing habitats from invasive species.

## IN THE WATER

### Eurasian Watermilfoil

**HABITAT:** Fertile lake sediments; highly disturbed or high nutrient lakes.  
**DESCRIPTION:** Submersed; large, feathery mats; stems pale, pink to reddish brown; leaves grey-green, whorls of 2-4 each with 7-21 pairs of leaflets; leaves lose stability and collapse around stem when taken out of the water; reproduces by stem fragments.

**TIP:** Usually dominates shallow lakes and rivers prevents boating, fishing, hunting and swimming; stems attach to boats, trailers, or anchors. **Specific lake trout fishery damage** - eradication nearly impossible.

### Northern Watermilfoil

**HABITAT:** Same habitat as Eurasian; Northern watermilfoil common in Alberta lakes.  
**DESCRIPTION:** Similar to Eurasian, but has 5-9 pairs of thin leaflets on each leaf in the leaf whorl; leaves keep rigidly when taken out of the water.

**TIP:** Sometimes dominates shallow water areas; interferes with use.

### Hydrilla

**HABITAT:** Lakes, rivers, reservoirs, ponds, and ditches; aquariums, water gardens.  
**DESCRIPTION:** Submersed; stems to 8m long; leaves in whorls of 4-8; small, pointed; leaf margins distinctly saw-toothed; toothed leaf midrib; tiny white flowers on long stalks; points - the tubers attached to the roots. (Tubers distinguish this plant from Isoetes).

**TIP:** "Most aquatic invader of North America"; outbursts Eurasian watermilfoil and Brazilian elodea; stems reduce sport fish size, water quality; can impact power generation, irrigation; prevents boating, fishing, hunting, and swimming. Do not release from aquariums or water gardens.

### Canadian Waterweed

**HABITAT:** Common in North America; lakes, rivers, ponds and ditches; food and habitat for fish, waterfowl, other wildlife.  
**DESCRIPTION:** Leaves in whorls of three along stem; to 5 mm wide.



Richard Potts

**TIP:** Occasional rampant growth; interferes with water access, aesthetics.

### Brazilian Elodea

**HABITAT:** Still or flowing waters, lakes, ponds, ditches, aquariums.  
**DESCRIPTION:** Submersed; rooted or drifting floating mats; leaves like large Canadian waterweed; buoyant whorls at least 2 cm long; 4-6 per whorl each (Hydrilla has banded midrib).



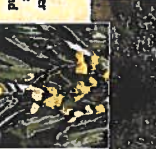
Leo J. Hobbie, University of Connecticut

**TIP:** May outcompete Eurasian watermilfoil; can cover hundreds of hectares; displaces native plants; negatively interferes with water recreation; poor fish habitat.

## WOODY SHORELINE

### Passion Vine

**HABITAT:** Invasive in riparian areas - southern Alberta and US States; shelterbelts, urban parks.  
**DESCRIPTION:** Deciduous shrub tree or shrub to 10.5 m; thorny stems; small, fragrant yellowish flowers June and July; hard green to yellow fruits.

**TIP:** Invades old fields, woodland edges, disturbed areas, stream and river banks, seasonal wetlands; forms dense shrub layer; displaces native species and dunes open areas.

### Salt Cedar

**HABITAT:** Margins of streams, river, irrigation canals, flood plains, seasonal wetlands.  
**DESCRIPTION:** Deciduous, loosely branched shrubs or small trees, 1.5-6.0 m; juniper-like scaly leaves; flowers small, pale pink to white, in finger-like clusters; deep tap root.



Steve Brown, Wild Blue Provincial Park

**TIP:** Salt accumulates in leaf scales; leaf litter stabilizes soil; unsuitable for native vegetation; high water use; lowers water tables; dense stands restricting access.

Dear Municipal Elected Officials and Leaders

**Re: Legalization of Edibles, Extracts and Topicals (EET) - Information for Municipalities**

I am pleased to provide you with the attached resource titled: *Phase Two of Cannabis Legalization - Edibles, Extracts and Topicals, Public Health Information for Municipalities*. Phase 2 of the federal government plan to legalize and regulate Edibles, Extracts and Topical (EET) forms of cannabis began on October 17, 2019, when the Cannabis Act was amended. Legal EET products are expected to be available in regulated cannabis retail stores by mid-January 2020. The legalization of EETs, three new and/or expanded classes of cannabis products, will have an impact on your existing local bylaws regarding consumption of cannabis in public places.

Alberta Health Services (AHS) advises that a precautionary approach be taken to minimize substance use harms and unintended consequences. This approach recognizes that it is easier to relax or remove restrictions at a later date than to tighten them after decisions have been announced, bylaws have been enacted, and investments have been made. This precautionary approach is consistent with the recommendations of the Federal Task Force on the Legalization and Regulation of Cannabis (Government of Canada, 2016). It applies the wisdom and lessons learned from alcohol and tobacco policy, which is to begin with more restrictive regulations and ease restrictions only as evidence becomes available.

AHS has developed the attached resource for municipalities to provide relevant information to assist in developing or revising local bylaws. This document outlines how EET may impact local regulations and how you can use this opportunity to strengthen or create new bylaws, based on a public health approach. It addresses consumption in public places, medical exemptions, multi-unit housing and festivals.

The location, method and accumulated volume of cannabis consumption can create a number of concerns, including increased youth access and increased normalization among youth due to increased visibility and exposure. Public consumption bylaws have the potential to protect the community and its citizens. Effective regulation, as identified in the intent behind federal legalization, supports federal and provincial goals to keep cannabis out of the hands of youth and to protect public health and safety.

AHS recognizes municipalities as important partners in public health. If you would like more information or support as you and your Council consider the impact of EET on your local bylaws, please feel free to contact me directly.

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# Phase 2 of Cannabis Legalization – Edibles, Extracts and Topicals

## PUBLIC HEALTH INFORMATION FOR MUNICIPALITIES

Alberta Health Services (AHS) recognizes that municipalities have options for their cannabis-related bylaws now that Edibles, Extracts and Topicals are included in the federal Cannabis Act. To assist in making these complex decisions, AHS encourages municipalities to consider social and health harms. Overall, because we know so little about the impacts of cannabis on the health of communities and Albertans, we support a more restrictive environment until a larger body of research can tell us more. **In this document you will find information about the public health approach to public consumption that addresses multi-unit housing, vaping, medical exemptions, and festivals.**

### PUBLIC CONSUMPTION

Restricting consumption of cannabis in public places sets up a regulatory environment that can help achieve the federal and provincial objectives of legalization, which include: protecting public health, restricting youth access, and protecting safety on roads, and in workplaces and public spaces.

#### ALBERTA HEALTH SERVICES ADVISES MUNICIPALITIES TO RESTRICT CONSUMPTION IN PUBLIC PLACES (INDOORS AND OUTDOORS) COMPLETELY

##### What does a complete restriction mean?

- It means cannabis consumption is prohibited in public places, limiting use to private residences only, for:
  - Combustibles (smoking/vaping/dabbing)
  - Edibles (beverages/food)
  - Extracts (sprays/capsules/ high potency concentrates)
- It means the protective measures that society has worked diligently for years to put in place for alcohol and tobacco will be the minimum for cannabis. This approach recognizes the decades of lessons learned from other intoxicating substances.

AHS recognizes there are special considerations related to multi-unit housing, medical users and festivals. We have provided additional information about these issues on the following page.

**SUBSTANCE USE COSTS  
ALBERTANS \$5.5 BILLION PER

Best practices in substance use help to reduce these costs and harms.

##### Why restrict public consumption?

- Restricting public consumption helps to limit public intoxication and reduce health and social harms in the community. This is best achieved through policy.
  - The Netherlands found less restrictive regulations caused health and social issues and are now implementing more restrictive regulations, including closing “coffee shops”.<sup>2</sup>
- Occupational Health & Safety regulates both alcohol and cannabis (intoxicating substances) in the workplace to prevent workplace harms.<sup>3,4</sup> In addition, public policies regulate alcohol consumption in public places to prevent harms. Restricting cannabis consumption in public places aligns with alcohol restrictions and mirrors the Occupational Health and Safety approach.
- It aligns with alcohol regulations. This means open bottles/cans of either cannabis or alcoholic beverages would not be allowed in public spaces.<sup>5</sup> This helps to prevent an increase of cannabis and alcohol-related harms and associated costs.
  - While there may be practical challenges to regulation enforcement (e.g., proof edibles contain cannabis), having regulations in place supports public health and safety.
- It prevents harm from second-hand cannabis smoke/vapour.<sup>6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11</sup>
- Children tend to copy what they observe and are influenced by the normality of any type of smoking behavior around them. Thus public consumption risks increasing cannabis use and associated harms.<sup>11</sup>
- All jurisdictions that have legalized cannabis advise starting with stricter regulations.<sup>12</sup>
- In all U.S. legalized states, decision makers banned public consumption at onset.



## SPECIFIC CONSIDERATIONS IMPACTING PUBLIC CONSUMPTION DECISIONS

### MULTI-UNIT HOUSING RESIDENTS

**If cannabis consumption is only allowed in private units/residences, some of which have no-smoking/vaping rules, does this disadvantage multi-unit housing residents' ability to consume cannabis?**

- All residents have the option of consuming other forms of cannabis in their private units, such as: edibles, drinks, capsules, sprays, or tinctures.
- As with tobacco, multi-unit housing complexes are advised to have smoke-free and vape-free indoor spaces and provide outdoor designated areas on common property for smoked or vaped products, five or more meters away from doors, windows and fresh-air intakes. If the complex is not smoke free, residents can request designated outdoor smoking and vaping areas to ensure the health and safety of all residents.

**What if residents want the fast-acting effects that smoking/vaping cannabis provides?**

- There are alternative products that have similar effects without the harmful effects of second-hand smoke or vapour.
- Residents can use outdoor designated consumption areas as recommended above.

### FESTIVALS

**Should festivals allow public consumption in the form of "cannabis gardens" (similar to beer gardens)?**

- The most protective option and best way to reduce short and long-term health and social harms is to not allow cannabis gardens, because:
  - It normalizes consumption. Normalization means that a behavior or activity becomes a 'normal part' of leisure and lifestyle and is no longer considered potentially harmful. The more often use is normalized and permitted, particularly in public spaces, the greater the risk of health and social harms to communities.
  - Children tend to copy what they observe and normalizing smoking behaviour is of particular concern. As seen with alcohol and tobacco, normalization leads to increases in rates of use, including associated harms.
  - Of potential noise and nuisance complaints. For example, the City of Hague, Netherlands now restricts public consumption because of the many complaints from residents and visitors regarding smell and noise.<sup>2</sup> The Calgary Stampede has designated their event as family friendly, by banning on-site consumption.<sup>16</sup> The Vancouver Park Board has banned 4/20 events because of the negative impact on residents, parks and facilities.<sup>17</sup>
- There may be liability for festival organizers due to risk of harm related to intoxication.

**Since people will smoke/vape in the general festival space anyway, wouldn't having a designated space for smoking/vaping be a better option?**

- The most protective option for the public is to prohibit public consumption.
- AHS, in collaboration with municipalities, will review and monitor harms over time. Recommendations and practices could shift as we learn more.

### VAPING

**Is vaping a safer form of consumption?**

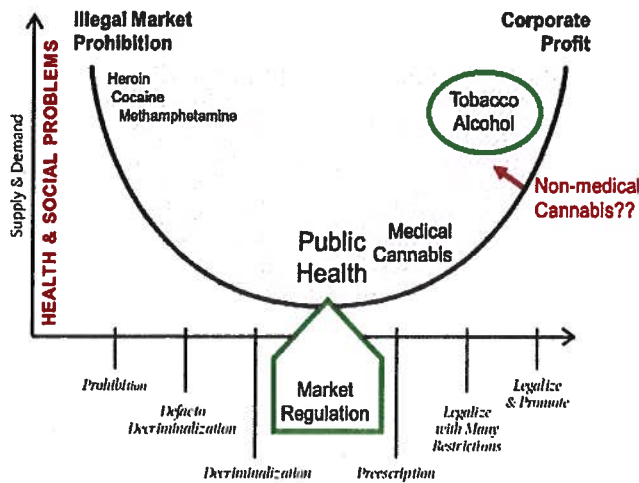
- Vaping is not without risks and the health impacts are not fully understood. Vaping may also result in more frequent use and use of higher THC products.<sup>13</sup>
- Harms related to vaping may include severe lung disease, however at the time of this writing not enough is known about these emerging cases to understand the cause or full extent of the risks and harm.
- There is no evidence that second-hand exposure to vapour is safe, thus a precautionary approach is advised.

### MEDICAL EXEMPTIONS ARE REQUIRED

- There are many different forms of cannabis products that medical users can choose from, particularly that do not involve smoking or vaping of the product.
- The Canadian Medical Association does not support combustible products as initial prescribed product for medical purposes, as alternative forms are available that minimize health risks to the patient and second hand exposure risks to those around them.<sup>15</sup>

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## WHAT IS A PUBLIC HEALTH APPROACH TO CANNABIS LEGALIZATION?



A public health approach strives to maximize benefits and minimize harms of substances, promote the health of all individuals of a population, decrease negative impacts on vulnerable populations, and ensure harms from interventions and legislation are not disproportionate to harms from the substances themselves.<sup>7</sup> Key considerations when developing bylaws and the practices that support them include:

- Taking a precautionary approach with stricter regulations to reduce health and social problems over time.
- Begin with a more restrictive framework and ease restrictions as evidence becomes available.
- Regulations allow for enforcement when needed and are not intended to shift burden of legalization to marginalized groups. Controls and education can be put in place to ensure an equitable approach to enforcement.

Dear Mayor Hanssen,

As you may know, the assessment models for wells, pipelines and machinery and equipment, which are used to determine the assessed values of these assets for taxation purposes, have not been updated since 2005. Over the past year, Municipal Affairs has been working on a review of the assessment models to ensure new technology is accounted for, current cost structures and industry practices are reflected, and result in a fair and transparent relative distribution of taxation.

The technical phase of the assessment model review, which included input from working groups of external subject matter experts, has now concluded. The initial results from the technical phase of the review indicate potentially significant shifts in assessment. As assessment changes can have consequential impacts to both municipalities and the oil and gas industry, I have determined additional engagement with industry and municipal associations is required before any final determinations are made.

Our aim is to ensure any changes resulting from the assessment model review do not have an adverse impact on the competitiveness of our energy sector or the viability of our rural municipalities. It is my intention this more robust stakeholder engagement be carried out in early 2020, with final decisions on the assessment model review to be made in spring. As a result, the changes to the assessment models will need to be deferred until the 2021 municipal tax year.

In the absence of new assessment models, assessment year modifiers (AYMs) need to be established for the 2020 tax year. These modifiers are similar to a consumer price index, and are used to adjust the property assessments for regulated industrial property from the base cost year in order to reflect current values. To support the budgeting process municipalities are undertaking, attached are the approved AYM's for the 2019 Assessment Year (2020 Tax Year).

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In addition, a reduction in assessment for shallow gas assets will be applied for 2020 in order to continue the same magnitude of tax relief provided under the Shallow Gas Tax Relief Initiative (SGTRI) for 2019, and enable transition to the new assessment models for 2021. These wells and associated pipelines will receive a 35 per cent property assessment reduction for the 2020 tax year. It is my intention to apply the same criteria for this assessment reduction as were used to determine eligibility for tax relief under the SGTRI; there are approximately 70,000 wells and associated pipelines in Alberta meeting these criteria. As education tax credits will not be provided as they were under the SGTRI for 2019, municipalities will need to absorb the impact of this reduction in assessment.

Municipal Affairs is completing the annual updates to the Alberta Minister's Guidelines for taxation in 2020 to include the annual change to the AYMs, as well as the changes to the shallow gas assessments.

Further details on the engagement with municipal associations and industry organizations regarding the assessment model review will be provided by early January, 2020.

**RE: Approved FortisAlberta 2020 Distribution Rates**

As a follow up to our correspondence of September 2019, FortisAlberta has received approval from the Alberta Utilities Commission (AUC) for FortisAlberta's distribution rates, effective January 1, 2020. In addition, the AUC has approved transmission rider rates effective January 1, specifically the Balancing Pool Allocation Rider, Base Transmission Adjustment Rider and the Quarterly Transmission Adjustment Rider. FortisAlberta collects and flows through all transmission costs billed by the Alberta Electric System Operator (AESO) as approved by the AUC.

The attached chart illustrates the estimated percentage and average changes for each rate class based on estimated consumption and demands between a December 2019 and January 2020 bundled bill from your retailer. The bundled bill percentages indicated on the attached chart will vary slightly compared to the version you received in September, as it reflects the transmission rider rate adjustments.

The Maintenance Multiplier under Rate 31 was approved to be reduced from 1.09 to 1.08 for those streetlights identified in FortisAlberta's LED conversion program. In addition, adjustments were approved by the AUC for the Maximum Investment Levels effective January 1, 2020. The chart reflecting these approved levels is also included in this correspondence.

The AUC also approved an update for Option D - Flat Rate Option on an interim basis. This offer would accommodate the connection of multiple low wattage, customer-owned and installed, non-lighting devices at multiple disparate locations without attracting a rate minimum charge and retailer administration charge for each device connected. This offer is upon agreement with the customer and at the discretion of FortisAlberta.
